Kendall (1809-1867) was one of the most important and influential men of his day. In 1837, Kendall founded the New Orleans Picayune, and for 30 years guided the paper and built it into a powerful force for Texas and westward

expansion. Almost from the beginning of the Picayune Kendall was concerned about the fate of Texas, joining the clamor for annexation in 1837. Kendall became a lifetime champion of Texas after making trips to Houston, Galveston, and Austin in 1838-39 to arrange for expanded circulation of his newspaper into Texas. In 1841 he joined the Texan Santa Fe Expedition as a reporter. The party was captured in New Mexico, and Kendall spent 2 years in prison in Mexico. His Narrative of the Texan Santa Fe Expedition (1844), the best account of the expedition and one of the best campaign narratives ever written, was a 19th century best-seller. During the Mexican-American War Kendall catapulted to great fame as the first modern war correspondent with his dramatic front-line stories written while riding with the Texas Rangers and General Worth. magnificent illustrated portfolio on the War has been called "the very best American battle scenes in existence" (Bennett).

Although Kendall received a Texas land grant in 1841, he did not move to Texas until after the War. He settled for a time near New Braunfels and after several moves finally purchased a ranch in present Kendall County (named after him), where he undertook sheep raising with the same intensity he had devoted to journalism. Kendall is known as "the father of the sheep business in Texas" (Handbook of Texas). Included in the collection there is even a daguerreotype of the first pedigreed sheep brought to Texas!

The collection also documents the myriad activities of the Kendall women, especially George's wife, Adeline de Valcourt, and their daughter, Georgina, neither of whom have been studied by scholars of women's history. In 1849 Kendall met and married Adeline (1830-1924) in her native France where their 4 children were born. Adeline was beautiful, cultivated, and strong. After George died and left her in debt, she took over management of their ranches and showed great executive ability. The elegant, intelligent Georgina (1850-1947) became the family historian, and it is only through her efforts that the Kendall Archive was preserved. She is still fondly remembered in San Antonio, where she was active in all aspects of its cultural life.

Some idea of the Kendall Archive may be obtained by consulting the bibliography of Fayette Copeland's biography Kendall of the Picayune (Norman, 1943, pp. 321-3). Although a few items listed by Copeland have strayed from the collection, there are also significant items in the archive which are not mentioned by Copeland. A full

inventory is available, so we will mention only a few of the high spots.

Personal possessions of George Kendall include: his ivory handled boot pistols made in London preserved in original box; his gold watch and chain engraved with the buffalo hunting scene used as the frontispiece of his book on the Santa Fe Expedition; his signet ring received for participation in the Mexican-American War; his bronze medal for serving as aide-de-camp to General Worth; his drinking horn fitted with silver and semi-precious stones and with his initials engraved on a silver heraldric shield.

Manuscript material includes Kendall's original Texas land grant signed by Anson Jones and much other material on land matters; voluminous notes for Kendall's projected history of the Mexican-American War (to date unpublished); correspondence from Robert E. Lee, General Worth, DeCordova, Persifor Smith, J. Antonio Navarro, Greeley, King, Holbrook, Lumsden, his publishers, etc., along with Kendall's numerous letters to Adeline (1850's) and other family members. Present are contemporary English translations of what appear to be captured Mexican dispatches from the War between Rejón, Santa Anna, and others. Adeline's letters to George are included, as well as many of her ranch journals. Also represented is a massive amount of Georgina's correspondence (including her retained copies), historical notes, family letters, etc. The photography collection is particularly rich, including daquerreotypes, tintypes, cartes-de-visite, and other photographs of Kendall, his family, and their ranches. Also present are 2 large oil paintings of Kendall in later life, one of which hung in the Picayune offices for many years, a miniature on bone of Kendall as a young man, and the 1862 painting of Post Oak Springs Ranch illustrated in Copeland's book. Wheat, Mapping the Transmississippi West I:7 & p. 20: "On [this map] appear certain of the Niza placenames...notably Civola...A beautiful and significant little map." This map is from the 1548 edition of Ptolemy's Geography, the first to contain a series of regional maps of America. The map was never reprinted from this plate, which shows Yucatan as an island. J. entdeckte zwischen dem 1698 und 1701 J. das Californien eine Halbinsel sey." This map incorporates elements of Kino's 1701 map (Wheat 83 & 89) and the curious Nueva Navara map of 1710 (Wheat 91). Features of the Nueva Navara map include the large island at the mouth of the Colorado River, the interior mountains of the Sierra Madre, use of the designation "Neu Navarra," etc. Elements retained from the 1701 Kino map are the layout of the islands in the Gulf of California, courses of the rivers, names of the Indian tribes, etc. Burrus (Kino and the Cartography of Northwestern New Spain) discusses the evolution and various printings of Kino's landmark maps, but he does not mention the present one. At the lower left is a colored inset map measuring $11-1/4 \times 11-1/2$ inches entitled "Map Showing Agricultural and Varieties of Soils in the State of Texas." This map is one of the few maps that shows disputed Greer County as a part of Texas; in 1896 the Supreme Court ruled Greer County to be under U.S. jurisdiction (see Handbook of Texas I, p. 730-32). Roessler was one of those controversial self-promoters who seem to flourish in Texas. Born in Hungary and trained as a geologist, he worked on the Texas Geological Survey in the 60's and was associated the the Texas Land and Immigration Co. of New York in the 70's. He was accused of thievery and plagiarism, but his maps are the best contemporary records of agricultural and mineral wealth. \$5,000.00

Ross used Austin's map as the starting point for his format and created one of the earliest, perhaps the first, Texas map designated as a railroad map. Surviving the great panic of 1855, their company grew rapidly, adding Ben Holladay's Prairie and Rocky Mountain section to its overland stagecoach mail service in 1866 (see item 138 in this catalogue). Wells, Fargo & Co. was one of the major forces in westward expansion, transportation, and commerce. \$1,500.00
